THIS WEEK'S LESSON: LYING SLIME



IN THE CAR:

Ask your child what they learned about this week on the drive home:

With some forms of slime you can see through it like a window – though not too clearly. When their father was old and could not see well, Jacob tricked him into giving Jacob the blessing meant for Esau. Lying can lead to getting slimed, because God always sees clearly. Genesis 27:1-33, 41-45, Jacob Steals the Blessing



MANGING OUT:

Make this week's lesson real:

Share a time when you tried to cover one lie with another, or a time when you told the truth even though it cost you. How did that situation turn out? How might it have turned out if you'd made the opposite choice?



MAT DINNER:

Here are some great discussion starters:

- Why did Jacob lie to his father?
- How did Jacob's deception tear his family apart?
- Why is it important to be truthful, even if it means getting in trouble?



AT BEDTIME:

Quiz your child on this week's memory verse:

"But I call out to God. And the Lord saves me." Psalm 55:16 (NIRV)



PARENT TIME:

What you need to know:

Lying makes us look slimy, and the more we lie, the slimier we look. It's important for all of us who follow Christ to be honest and truthful - at home, at school, and at work. Ask God to give you the courage to always be truthful so you can model that honesty to your kids.
